Scripture Reading: Psalms 103:13-17

The Lord is like a father to his children,

Reflection:

When Daniel was in high school, he really struggled to wake up in the morning. I did everything I could to get him up, from playing loud music to pouring water on his head (desperate times call for desperate measures!) I was really worried he would go off to college and never wake up for classes. In a last ditch effort, I bought what Amazon declared was the loudest alarm clock available. It was called the Sonic Boom. One of the reviews said it was like the Russian army invading your bedroom in the morning. The first morning it went off, the whole house shook and Richard and I sat up immediately in our bed on the other side of the house. No living thing could sleep with the Sonic Boom to wake them from their slumber.

Today is Ash Wednesday. Many of you have asked what the purpose of Ash Wednesday is for us as Methodists. I like to think of Ash Wednesday as an alarm clock for our tired, routine lives. In the midst of a global pandemic, internet church services, and loss of connection, we have been coasting spiritually. We need a spiritual Sonic Boom to wake us from our deep slumber and remind us how short these lives really are! Are we using our one and only life in a way that brings glory to God? Are we right with God? Are we putting value in things with eternal value? What changes do we need to make to reorient our lives toward God and away from the things of this world? For what do we need to repent?

Ash Wednesday reminds us how fragile and temporary our lives in this world truly are. As we place the ashes on each forehead in the sign of the cross, we say, "From dust you have come and to dust you will return." All of us will return to dust. But God and God's love are eternal. I don't know about you, but I need that reminder.

Prayer:

Lord, Thank you for loving me. Wake me up from my spiritual sleepiness so that I can be fully focused on you. During this season of Lent, help me to be fully aware of your presence in my life. I want to be closer to you! I'm sorry for how I have messed up over and over again. Forgive me, Lord. I know this life is short. May I use my days to glorify you and you alone. In the name of Jesus, Amen.

Ash Wednesday Becky Jordan

Scripture Reading:

Exodus 32:11-14 Joshua 10:12-14 1 Kings 18:42-46 Acts 4:30-31

Reflection:

According to the Oxford Dictionary, juggernaut means, "a huge, powerful, and overwhelming force or institution." Moses prayed like a juggernaut in Exodus 32, as an intercessor when the Israelites worshipped a golden calf and God's anger burned against them, wanting to destroy His chosen people. Years later, his successor Joshua, leader of Israel, mighty military and prayer warrior, prayed in chapter 10, petitioning God to make the sun stand still over Gibeon and the moon to remain over the Valley of Aijalon in a battle the Lord had promised victory to Israel. Elijah earnestly prayed to God high upon a mountain top for rain which would end the three-year drought and display His power. In Acts 4, Peter and John ardently prayed for the Lord to work mightily through them with signs and wonders in the name of Jesus. Old Testament leaders and prophets and apostles of the New Testament had access to the same God who still sits upon His throne desiring to hear and answer the prayers and petitions of his children.

During this time of Lent, let us lift our prayers and petitions as the biblical juggernauts who preceded us. In Isaiah 43:19, we read, "Look; I am about to do something new; even now it is coming. Do you not see it? Indeed, I will make a way in the wilderness, rivers in the desert." (HCSB) God has given this verse to various members of New Hope over the past three years. Let us fervently seek God's will for New Hope and align our direction with his master plan in our lives, in New Hope's mission and ministry which we undertake in our community, our country, and the world – the master plan evidenced in His Word time and time again.

Prayer:

Heavenly Father, I cry out to you for only Your Voice and Your Direction. You have told me You are doing a new thing. You brought me to Mt. Precipice and reminded me again of Your Word. Give me eyes to see, ears to hear, wisdom to discern, and boldness to step out in Your Strength. In the Name Above All Names I humbly offer my prayer, Amen.

Reflection:

Daily Devotional Julie Burroughs

Scripture Reading: Philippians 4:6-7

Have no anxiety about anything, but in everything by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving let your requests be made known to God. And the peace of God, which passes all understanding, will keep your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus.

Reflection:

A lot of parenting involves learning patience. When my son was an infant and toddler, he instructed me in patience through battling sleep. I held him, rocked him and sang to him, but if I were not completely relaxed, he sensed it, would not relax and postpone sleep. I had to not only take time to hold, rock and sing, but I had to have patience with him through the process. This patience could not be faked. He could always tell when it was not genuine. Impatience crawls under the skin and seeps out somehow, revealing a missing inner peace no matter what the face attempts to show.

Parenthood is one of the most anxiety-ridden roles in life that comes to my mind. The worry related to it can be so oppressive. My child can be quite accident prone. He has had a concussion from a mere slip on wet pavement in our driveway, and he once shut his thumb in a door jam, resulting in losing his thumbnail, bleeding that was difficult to stop, and a chipped bone.

So, what did I do for personal peace and genuine patience in such challenging parenting moments? I pray. I breathe deeply and clear my mind as best I can. When singing, I sing Christian music, focusing in on the words. I move my mind from other distractions and busyness and instead count my blessings. All of these are forms of prayer. Whatever forms you use, pouring out in conversation with God releases anxiety and realizes peace.

"Have no anxiety about anything" sounds like the perfect "get out of jail free" card when it comes to worry. Of course, just like you have to draw that card in a game of Monopoly, you have to take action to have no anxiety. Think about how thankful you are in a game of Monopoly to pull that "get out of jail free" card out of the deck. That is when to be thankful, at the moment of prayer.

Prayer:

Lord, Please grant me self-control to practice techniques for patience in those situations where impatience likes to creep in and steal my peace. Remind me of the blessings I have. Thank You for always hearing and answering!

Daily Devotional Pastor Vicki Harrison

Scripture Reading: I Thess. 5:17

Never stop praying.

Also take a moment to read some of Jesus' teachings on prayer: Matthew 6:5-15, 7:7-11, Mark 11:23-26, Luke 11:1-13, Luke 18:1-14, John 15:7.

Reflection:

In Acts 4, when Peter and John were arrested and released, they prayed for boldness. When Peter was arrested again the church offered "constant prayer" for him (Acts 12:5). In fact, they prayed all night long (we stay up worrying all night long, they prayed all night long). When the seven were appointed in Jerusalem to care for the widows, they prayed about it (Acts 6:6). When the church in Antioch first sent out Paul and Barnabas to preach, they prayed about it (Acts 13:3). Peter was in prayer when the vision concerning Cornelius was revealed to him (Acts 10:9; 11:5). Paul and Silas were praying while in the middle of a Philippian jail (Acts 16:25). When Paul and Barnabas appointed elders in the churches they planted, they prayed about it (Acts 14:23). Not, please Lord, bless our decision which we already made, but truly guide our thoughts, actions, and decisions. The early believers prayed often and they prayed persistently. Paul writes in I Thess. 5:17, "Never stop praying."

What's interesting to me is that they prayed persistently even when they didn't get the "results" they wanted. Stephen and James were martyred but that didn't stop the early Christians; they still prayed persistently for Peter. They must have been frustrated and grief-stricken, but they kept praying boldly nonetheless.

Prayer is not simply about getting the results we desire. There is no special prayer formula. We tend to think prayer + faith = results (love, healing, relationships, peace). But that just isn't how it works. God answers prayers. We can trust in that. But he doesn't always answer the prayers the way we want him to. And probably a more important point --- a BIG part of prayer is about what God is doing in us when we pray. Prayer is essentially an act of submission. When we pray, we are saying, "God, we need you. You are Lord of this world and we are not. You are in control. We are not. We yield to you." And there is something that happens within us when we do that.

Sometimes, our prayers are answered swiftly, just the way we want. Other times, the answer we receive isn't exactly the way we imagined. Sometimes, we don't get to see the answer on this side of eternity. But Jesus tells us to pray boldly, persistently, and with determination. Paul says to pray continually. Why? Because persistent prayer changes our heart. We draw closer to God. Through the process of regular, persistent prayer, we begin to look more like Jesus. And isn't that the point?

Prayer:

Dear God, Thank you for always listening to my prayers. Give me the strength and courage to pray boldly and continuously, and change my heart in the process. Lord, I submit to you. In the name of Jesus, Amen.

Today, read the Lord's Prayer through slowly, with your eyes following the words but your heart directing them to God. Praying it aloud will help.

Next, read the prayer through again, this time making it very personal. "My Father in heaven . . Give me today the food I need . . . forgive me my sins . . . " While we can never forget the prayer is corporate and concerned with others too, it's fine to speak personally to God through it. Again, don't rush. Pray slowly and deliberately.

Finally, now take one more reading of the prayer, but this time linger on each line, inviting God to bring specific people, situations and responses to mind as you pray.

Matthew 6:9-13,

Pray like this:

Our Father in heaven,
may your name be kept holy.
May your Kingdom come soon.
May your will be done on earth,
as it is in heaven.
Give us today the food we need,
and forgive us our sins,
as we have forgiven those who sin against us.
And don't let us yield to temptation,
but rescue us from the evil one.



Daily Devotional Paul Brooks

Scripture Reading: Psalm 3:3-5

Let the words of my mouth and the meditation of my heart be acceptable in your sight, O Lord my strength and my redeemer. Amen.

But you, Lord, are a shield around me, my glory, the One who lifts my head high. I call out to the Lord, and he answers me from his holy mountain. I lie down and sleep; I wake up again, because the Lord sustains me.

My experience:

In the morning, I had tested positive for COVID-19. As a chronic asthmatic, I had reason to be concerned. Barbara's negative test had not come back yet, and she was worried for us both, but we knew we must quarantine in the house. She was most worried that I would sleep alone and she wouldn't know if I slipped into a crisis. I put on a brave face with her: "I'll be fine. I have my phone; I'll call you if I need you." But alone in my bed that first night, I was scared. I didn't want to fall asleep. And so I prayed. And prayed. And prayed. And God answered me.

As I prayed, I felt a blanket of comfort wrap around me. It brings tears to my eyes to remember it. I felt a peace that I cannot put into words, settling my soul. I knew that no matter what happened, I was going to be fine. My eyes grew heavy, my heart quieted down and I mercifully drifted off to sleep. When I awoke the next morning, I was refreshed and thankful. I was confident that I was in the Lord's hands. The Lord sustains me!

Prayer:

Almighty and most merciful Father, your love and compassion for us surpasses anything we could ever hope for. Though we have erred and strayed like lost sheep, you never leave our side. Through Jesus, you restore us in your sight. Through the Holy Spirit, you comfort and guide us in your ways. Pour down on us the continual dew of your blessing, that we may truly please you. Let us give thanks to you in all circumstances, and always keep our trust in you. Through our mediator and advocate, Jesus Christ. Amen.

Scripture Reading: Luke 18:1-8

And he told them a parable, to the effect that they ought always to pray and not lose heart. He said, 'In a certain city there was a judge who neither feared God nor regarded man; and there was a widow in that city who kept coming to him and saying, 'Vindicate me against my adversary.' For a while he refused; but afterward he said to himself, 'Though I neither fear God nor regard man, yet because this widow bothers me, I will vindicate her, or she will wear me out by her continual coming." I tell you, he will vindicate them speedily.

Reflection:

I highly dislike "push notifications" on my devices because they are, well, pushy! I love to create checklists, but allowing my device to essentially do this for me and continually nag me about what it (or the various app creators) deems most important, creates a lot of stress for me. I feel tied to my phone with a list that never seems to get completely checked off and somehow missing what is important. There doesn't ever seem to be a rewarding sense of accomplishment, but more of a burden of never feeling good enough. Fortunately, I can select which apps and features "allow" push notifications, so I choose to limit them a great deal.

God, on the other hand, allows all the "notifications" I throw at Him come through and be marked as important. Whether I put in one or one hundred requests (prayers), He gets the notification. He hears me and sees me every time. He doesn't get stressed out or irritated by them, because He's already known and completed them every time.

Prayer:

Lord, Thank You that no worry is too insignificant to turn over to You in prayer and that Your perfect love dispels all need for fear and anxiety.

Scripture Reading: Philippians 4:6

Don't worry about anything, but in everything, through prayer and petition with thanksgiving, let your requests be made known to God. Philippians 4:6

Reflection:

Each year as Lent approaches I begin considering what I might "give up" for this season. As Christians we accept this time of reflection and preparation for Easter as a period of sacrifice, a symbol of the great love Jesus demonstrated as he went to the cross and bore the weight of our sins. We look for areas in our lives where we can lessen or omit something that isn't good for us, like sweets, coffee, fast food, watching too much tv, and so on. Even in this modern world where we can quickly search the internet for lots of ideas for how to tackle the sacrifice of Lent, I had never considered giving up something less tangible, like worry. I mean if you think about it, it fits the bill, right? It isn't good for me, it keeps me from the things of Christ, it is a useless waste of valuable time I could devote to kingdom work, and it is down right exhausting. But giving up worry doesn't feel sacrificial, in fact the idea of not worrying sounds liberating.

As I have thoughtfully considered the idea of "giving up" worry, I have come to a simple conclusion; though the outcome may be liberating, the journey of Lent may be one of the hardest ever. It's not like the cup of caffeine charged coffee I can watch swirl as I pour it down the drain; it is inside me, ingrained in my imperfect human brain. It's a part of how I plan, how I interact with the world, how I handle stress, even how I define the control I have over the everyday. I'm powerless against it, yet I somehow feel completely out of control with just the thought of it being absent. It's mine. It's part of who I am, right?

The Bible tells us over and over again (300 plus times) that God doesn't want us to worry. He didn't design us that way and he doesn't want that for us. But the Bible doesn't just say, "don't worry", it also tells us what to do when worry tries to take hold. Pray with gratitude to a loving Father who will gladly remind us He is in control of every detail of our lives. It is all in His hands.

Prayer:

Father God, lead me. Show me those things that prevent me from being all you have designed me for. Love me Father, when I press you away with my fears and worry and forget YOU ARE IN CONTROL. In this time of remembrance may I be washed with the knowing that your sacrifice was made so that I might live fully and abundantly for your kingdom. Amen

Scripture Reading: Matthew 14:23

And after he had dismissed the crowds, he went up on the mountain by himself to pray. When evening came, he was there alone.

Reflection:

Have you ever met someone at an event or while out someplace, and then sought out a chance to be alone with them? When you get away from others, activities, noise, etc., you can talk and get to know each other better. Alone time together helps build relationship. Even when you're not new to each other, alone time together helps sustain relationship. One way couples work at this is through "date nights."

Jesus went off alone to pray. But it's not that He was completely alone. He was alone with God!

I am never alone. God is always with me. Going off "alone" to pray is just getting to a time and place that's quiet and away from distractions where I can talk with and focus on the Lord to build and sustain my relationship with Him. Take advantage of the moments where you just happen to have some time alone with the Lord, but also be intentional about scheduling "date night" kind of moments with Him too. While corporate prayer and worship are important, so is alone time together with God!

Prayer:

Lord, Thank You that I am never truly alone! Thank You that when I get a chance to "get away" from others, that I can be alone with You. Help my relationship with You grow stronger with continuous prayer.

Reflection:

My Story:

Reflection:

Recently, my family went to the second session of a new dog training class. We ran late, forgot Rocky's harness and leash, and were all tired and more than a little discombobulated. Class went less than spectacular. I barely held back tears on the way home. Later that night, I couldn't sleep. My mind kept wandering with ideas how to prepare for class the following week to avoid disaster and make up for the poor performance.

Then I realized how much I have to be thankful for: my son's maturity in getting in the car after class and apologizing for acting so loopy, my husband's willingness to help and attend this class, his initiative to solve the forgotten harness and leash issue by stopping at a Petsmart along the way, and that we have a happy and healthy and eager-to-please dog.

As I realized one class-night-gone-crazy did not outweigh our many blessings, it occurred to me the best preparation for the following week I could do, was pray, leaving it in God's hands. We still practiced "homework", laid out stuff to go beforehand, and made sure to leave home earlier, but other circumstances did not stress me out the same. Did we have a perfect performance with no issues? Certainly not! But I enjoyed the time much better.

Praying about everything, especially even the smallest thing, if it is something that may worry me, is simply treating God as a friend. Praying about my activities is showing a deep desire that I want His involvement in my life, my whole life. As much and more than any friend, God wants to listen to whatever I have to say. Nothing is the "wrong" topic!

Prayer:

Dear God, Thank You for wanting to be a part of my whole life and that no part of my life is too small or insignificant or unrelated to speak to You about.

Scripture Reading: Psalm 23

Reflection:

It is hard to tell the exact occasion of the writing of the 23rd Psalm. We know that King David was older, as the text suggests he had both enemies and had experienced hardship and prosperity. Possibly, the 23rd Psalm was written while David was at Mahanaim, as he contemplated how the battle was going between his forces and those of his son, Absalom, during the civil war caused by Absalom's rebellion. David would certainly have been grief-stricken and heartbroken. And yet, in the midst of some of the darkest circumstances of his life, there is no doubt where his life finds its center. His center, his protection, his comfort, and his hope come from the Lord and the Lord alone.

When life is uncertain or difficult, I find it helpful to pray over the 23rd Psalm. I picture King David in the midst of his troubles. I think about all the people over the course of history who have prayed this powerful psalm. Then, I actually picture myself being led by still waters and lying in a pleasant, bugless green pasture. I visualize each line of the psalm, praying it over and over again. It helps me center myself in God, becoming fully immersed in his comfort and protection.

Prayer:

Thank you, Lord, for your comfort and protection. Thank you for being present with us in the good and the bad, in the mountain and the valley. Help us center ourselves in you and fill us with your amazing peace. Amen.

Scripture Reading: John 10:27

My sheep listen to my voice; I know them, and they follow me."

Reflection:

A few years ago, I purchased a pre-owned car that was engineered to respond to verbal commands. After it was synced in, you were supposed to be able to tell the car to do something and it would acknowledge and do it. I was so excited when I took it out for the first time. It was on a hot Florida day when the heat was radiating from the scorching pavement.

I leaned over and said, "Turn the climate to 71 degrees." It spoke back, "Now turning the climate to 81 degrees." I spoke louder, "Turn the climate to 71 degrees." It responded again, this time saying, "Now turning the climate to 84 degrees." This time I bent over the dash board and in a loud voice shouted, "TURN THE CLIMATE TO 71 DEGREES!" Then it said, "This system is not programmed for temperatures above 84 degrees."

It was at that moment I heard God speak, "Now you know what I feel like when I am talking to you." Busted.

When we decide to follow Jesus, the Holy Spirit "syncs" us in. We can hear His voice when we are lost, we can hear His voice when we are hurting, we can hear His voice when we say "Here am I Lord, send me." All that He requires from us is to simply listen.

Listening is a simple thing but it is so hard to do in our noisy world when we are thinking about other things and listening to other voices. It may require us to do impossible things like turn off the tv and push back the distractions enough so we can hear Him!

This 40 day season of Lent is an opportunity to listen for His voice - not only for ourselves but for our Church.

Reflection:

Nothing Can Silence The Song

There is something deep and powerful about music. It can motivate. It can praise. It can spark gratitude, peace and joy in a way that few things can. It is no wonder that music is so intricately woven through the history of our faith.

Scripture Reading: Isaiah 40:31

For those who trust in the Lord will find new strength. They will soar high on wings like eagles. They shall run and not grow weary. They shall walk and not faint.

Reflection:

This is my favorite passage in the Old Testament for a few different reasons. One is the imagery of soaring high, on wings like eagles. I served in the 101st Airborne Division, and our nickname is the Screamin' Eagles. Since that time, I've been fascinated by the incredible power, strength, and beauty of the eagle.

The passage also holds special meaning for me, as it helped me get through a tough situation. When I was in Airborne school, I got the flu the night before a critical run had to be completed. If I did not complete the run with my class, I would have to repeat the entire week's training (trust me, I did NOT want to repeat a week of grueling training). That morning, I was sweating profusely, and didn't see any possible way I could keep pace with my class for the 3 mile run. But as I started, I began saying the words of this verse over and over. As my left foot hit the pavement, I said: "Run and not grow weary" and as my right foot hit the pavement, I said (under my breath) "Walk and not faint."

It was only the power of God that got me through that morning. I was sick as a dog. But I leaned on the power of prayer, on the power of Scripture, and on the power of the Holy Spirit, and God was good. And God still is!

Prayer:

Lord, Help us to lean upon you for strength; may we run and not be weary, may we walk and not faint.

Daily Devotional Julie Burroughs

Scripture Reading: Luke 5:16

But he [Jesus] withdrew to the wilderness and prayed

Reflection:

Withdrawing involves an intentional moving away from something or somewhere. In Jesus' case, He removed Himself from the hubbub of the "multitudes" gathering to listen to Him and looking for healing (verse 15). He was getting away from His daily grind. The verse indicates an intentional move not only away from one place, but also to a specific other place: the wilderness.

I don't know about you, but the word "wilderness" doesn't make me think of quiet and calm. While it might be isolated from people, there are still possibly animals and other elements of nature and place that might be, well, "wild." Sometimes a house full of children and pets with a lot going on can be thought of as its own sort of wilderness (it's certainly wild, at any rate). Sometimes a city is described as a wilderness - the cement jungle. What is your wilderness? To pray, remove yourself from the daily grind. Face whatever wilderness is available. Jesus didn't get on a plane to head to some beach, lake, city or jungle. He went to the desert, because that is what was right there where He was.

Don't neglect, make space. One morning I sat at the table with my Bible and prayer journal. My son asked if I would play a game with him, to which I replied, "as soon as I finish my Bible study time." He was still in the next room bouncing and playing - being the little wild thing he is, but I turned my focus on the Lord and had some quality time to get my day started right.

Prayer:

Lord, Help me realize that I don't need to search for peace to pray, but to pray for peace. You give me the place I need to be and here it is that I will pray. Grant me Your peace that passes all understanding, no matter the wilderness I face.

As you reflect on this prayer today, also read Ephesians 6:10-18.

Reflection:

Reflect on this Scripture from Colossians and then read the poem attributed to Mother Teresa. How do you struggle with this? What do you need to ask God for today so that you can remember it is, really, truly, only about an audience of one?

Colossians 3:23-24, Work willingly at whatever you do, as though you were working for the Lord rather than for people. Remember that the Lord will give you an inheritance as your reward, and that the Master you are serving is Christ.

Scripture Reading: Psalm 138:3

Reflection:

Scripture Reading: John 11:41-43

So they rolled the stone aside. Then Jesus looked up to heaven and said, "Father, thank you for hearing me. You always hear me, but I said it out loud for the sake of all these people standing here, so that they will believe you sent me." Then Jesus shouted, "Lazarus, come out!"

Reflection:

Leading up to this moment in which Jesus raises his friend Lazarus from the dead, things were contentious for Jesus. He had several confrontations with people, even those who had seen him do miracles, yet find other reasons to not believe he is the Messiah sent by God. Not only do they not believe, but they are plotting to kill him.

I don't know about you, but I often get in the way of God's work in my life. I get wrapped up in working on and fixing the problems I face that I tend to forget whose I am. I love the adage that says "work as if it all depends on me and pray as if it all depends on God". If you are familiar with this quote you know it is credited to St. Augustine and that I worded it wrong. Prayer comes first. But I quoted it the way that most often reflects my own actions. Honestly, sometimes not only do I work first, I omit the prayer.

I could easily fit into the crowd surrounding Jesus as he raises Lazarus. Jesus says out loud for all to hear, "Father, Thank you for always hearing me..." This verse serves as a good reminder to me to pray because Jesus is the Messiah and the Holy Spirit that dwells in me is my connection to the power, might, and glory of the Father.

This season of prayer that pastor Vicki is leading us into is so important to New Hope and I don't want to get it backwards. Would you join me in flipping the adage to start with "Pray as if it all depends on God"?

Daily Devotional Pastor Vicki Harrison

Scripture Reading: 2 Cor. 5: 14-17

Either way, Christ's love controls us. Since we believe that Christ died for all, we also believe that we have all died to our old life. He died for everyone so that those who receive his new life will no longer live for themselves. Instead, they will live for Christ, who died and was raised for them.

So we have stopped evaluating others from a human point of view. At one time we thought of Christ merely from a human point of view. How differently we know him now! This means that anyone who belongs to Christ has become a new person. The old life is gone; a new life has begun!

Reflection:

The Apostle Paul, who wrote this Scripture, is saying, "I know personally that God's love can change people!" Because of Christ's death on the cross, his old way of life – his angry, Christian-hating, law-obsessed way of life – it died up on that cross with Jesus. Now, he has an intimate relationship with a life-giving Savior. He became a different person when he received new life in Jesus. In fact, Paul went from a man who persecuted and stoned Christ-followers to one of the strongest, most amazing Christian missionaries of all time. He was made new. This was great news.

Even better news is that Paul is saying and we can be made new too. We also can experience transformation in Jesus Christ. No matter who we are or what we've done, when we say yes to Jesus, our old life dies and a new life begins. Remember, when we say yes to Jesus, the Holy Spirit, the Spirit of the Living God, comes and makes a home within us, transforming us from the inside out. This doesn't mean we just try a little harder and we become a better person. No, we become new people!

And yet, as we walk further on our faith journey, life gets messy and difficult. Sometimes, it feels like our "newness" has worn off. We don't feel new anymore. In my own life, as the pandemic has worn on, I simply felt tired and heavy burdened, not new! What God has taught me is that I have to be very intentional about staying connected, walking hand in hand with Jesus through prayer, reading Scripture, and daily worship. Being made new is not a one-time experience. I need God's renewing power every, single day! I need to constantly, continuously be reminded of who and whose I am. I am made new and transformed, a new creation, and a child of the one true King!

Prayer:

Lord Jesus, thank you for your amazing love and sacrifice. Thank you for salvation and the newness and transformation that can only come from you. Jesus, I need you. Fill me anew today so that I can be renewed and refreshed by your grace and power. I want to live like a new person, one who is totally and fully focused on you. In Your Name, Amen.

Scripture Reading: 1 Thessalonians 5:17,

Pray constantly

Reflection:

Have you ever thrown coins in a fountain, raised your feet off the floorboard of the car when crossing a railroad track, held your breath while traveling through a tunnel, and kissed the clock when all the digits were the same number (for example, 4:44)? All of these were fun games I played as a kid to occupy otherwise idle moments. All were accompanied by making a wish, which was thought to come true if the given procedure had been followed.

There were plenty of wishes to not come about, but that didn't keep me from the fun of playing the game.

Nowadays, I take such opportunities as a reminder to pray. I offer up a prayer request for whatever is my greatest wish or concern at the moment. Whether prompted to by reflexes from a childhood practice or just because something important is on your mind, turn every wish into a prayer.

Prayer:

Lord, please help me instill practices in myself to constantly remember to pray and "have a word" with You. May it be as fun as childhood games, a long-lasting impression and bring joy!

Daily Devotional Carina Lopez-Ramos

Scripture Reading: Psalm 6

O Lord, do not rebuke me in your anger, or discipline me in your wrath.

Be gracious to me, O Lord, for I am languishing;
O Lord, heal me, for my bones are shaking with terror.

My soul also is struck with terror,
while you, O Lord—how long?

Turn, O Lord, save my life;
deliver me for the sake of your steadfast love.

Reflection:

At times, I have a hard time saying, "I'm sorry." Actually, I do say "I'm sorry, but ..." My acknowledgment of how I have hurt someone or disappointed someone is often followed by my excuse as to why it happened. However, I don't think I'm unique in this. Perhaps you may too, have a hard time saying it. The psalmist expresses deep sorrow for his sin, asking God for help and forgiveness. Both his body and his soul feel overwhelmed with terror. David realizes he is experiencing the consequence of his own sin. He cries out in physical and spiritual pain, knowing that God's discipline is justified for the ways he has disobeyed God.

David's confession before God is anchored in his confidence that God will forgive. He calls out for God's deliverance, convinced that God will hear and answer because of God's steadfast love. Despite the situation in which David finds himself, he knows that he will not permanently abide in terror and distress because of God's unfailing love. "Depart from me, all you workers of evil, for the Lord has heard the sound of my weeping. The Lord has heard my supplication; the Lord accepts my prayer" (v. 8–9). As we enter this Lenten season, we can say, "I'm sorry" before God. When we confess before our merciful Lord, we are assured of God's forgiveness. Instead of saying, "I'm sorry, but" we can say, "I'm sorry because of your steadfast love and forgiveness!" What a wonderful God we serve! What a wonderful God who still accepts us with all our flaws, with arms wide open.

Prayer:

Father God, we confess before you our sins, our brokenness, our mess, and our lives. We all need to experience your abundant mercy. We are not perfect Lord but please help us each and every day to come before you to say, "I'm sorry" with a sincere heart and no explanation. Thank you for your grace. We pray this in Jesus's name, Amen.

Scripture Reading: Luke 6:12

In these days he went out to the mountain to pray; and all night he continued in prayer to God.

Reflection:

No matter when or where we are, mountains stand remote, somehow removed from congestion and busyness characteristic of valleys below. They are majestic in height, drawing our attention and encouraging the expenditure of effort required to climb.

Once on a mountain, you experience a different environment than below. You breathe different air and respond to exertion differently. You have a different perspective not just of the ground below looking down from above, but also of things above and the mountain itself.

While prayer can and should happen anywhere and everywhere, it is good to sometimes get away from everyday tasks, take in a new perspective and quietly spend time talking to God alone.

Following mountaintop experiences, it's also good to come back down to share with others the hope and joy you found there.

Prayer:

Thank you, Lord, for your faithfulness! Help me remember and keep in constant communication with You, as Your line is always open.

"Now I am coming to you. I told them many things while I was with them in this world so they would be filled with my joy. I have given them your word. And the world hates them because they do not belong to the world, just as I do not belong to the world. I'm not asking you to take them out of the world, but to keep them safe from the evil one. They do not belong to this world any more than I do. Make them holy by your truth; teach them your word, which is truth. Just as you sent me into the world, I am sending them into the world. And I give myself as a holy sacrifice for them so they can be made holy by your truth.

"I am praying not only for these disciples but also for all who will ever believe in me through their message. I pray that they will all be one, just as you and I are one—as you are in me, Father, and I am in you. And may they be in us so that the world will believe you sent me.

"I have given them the glory you gave me, so they may be one as we are one. I am in them and you are in me. May they experience such perfect unity that the world will know that you sent me and that you love them as much as you love me. Father, I want these whom you have given me to be with me where I am. Then they can see all the glory you gave me because you loved me even before the world began!

"O righteous Father, the world doesn't know you, but I do; and these disciples know you sent me. I have revealed you to them, and I will continue to do so. Then your love for me will be in them, and I will be in them." [Amen.]

Lord, I know that prayer is always a blessing, but it's easy for me to neglect it. Help me to make it a top priority. Please increase my desire and my opportunities to spend time with you. Dear God help me to be devoted to prayer. Help me to connect with you in whatever way I can. Use me to help others grow in prayer as well. In Jesus name. Amen
